### MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION OF FUND PERFORMANCE

#### Investment Objective and Strategies

Our objective for this Fund is to grow capital for investors over the long-term by investing primarily in equity securities of smaller capitalized global companies.

The portfolio sub-advisor in respect of this Fund, Brandes Investment Partners, L.P. ("Brandes LP") uses a Graham & Dodd value approach when selecting the actual securities. This means that, on behalf of the Fund, they select securities of companies which, in their estimation have a higher value (intrinsic value) than is currently reflected in the stock market.

Brandes LP's intention is to create a portfolio of undervalued stocks available, in their estimation, diversified in ways described in the prospectus.

#### Risk

As an investor in this Fund, you should be prepared for short-term performance fluctuations, and be a patient, long-term holder.

There were no significant changes to the level or type of risk you would expect from the Fund over the course of the year. It continues to have a medium risk level. Refer to the Fund's simplified prospectus for a complete list of all risks.

#### Results of Operations from January 1, 2021 to December 31, 2021

##### **Markets & Effect**

2021 saw a few value equities rallies in its early months, as well as towards the end of the year. The U.S. market, as represented by the S&P 500 Index, posted an impressive 27.1% return, outperforming every other major equity index for the year. The U.S. market has now outperformed the Canadian market (as represented by the S&P/TSX Composite Index) for nine of the last 10 years; and the international market (as represented by the MSCI EAFE Index) for eight of the last 10 years.

Cyclical sectors, including energy and financials, posted the strongest returns for the year. The pickup in economic activity, as countries recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, is expected to benefit companies' earnings growth, particularly in export driven economies. In North America, there was heightened concern that recent wage increases and low unemployment may result in persistently higher inflation. Energy has also contributed significantly to inflationary pressures. Central banks in Canada, the U.S. and Europe have signaled a shift to a less accommodative monetary policy in the coming year.

Among global small cap companies, the S&P Developed Small Cap Index finished the year 13.8% higher than at the end of 2020. As with developed large cap equity indices, energy and financials were the best-performing sectors.

The S&P/TSX Composite Index rallied 25.1%. Nine of the 11 sectors posted double-digit returns, while health care was the only sector to suffer a loss for the year.

Emerging markets, as measured by the MSCI EM Index, did not keep up with developed markets in 2021, declining -3.4%. China was a major detractor from performance, as regulatory reforms and turmoil in the real estate sector drove equity markets lower. Amid the constant stream of macroeconomic and geopolitical news, it is important to remember that volatility is not unusual in emerging markets investing and, in Brandes' opinion, has often created attractive yet overlooked opportunities.

## **Performance**

The Fund's Series A units outperformed its benchmark, gaining 21.8% versus a gain of 13.8% for the S&P Developed Small Cap Index (the "Index").

The Fund returns are after the deduction of fees and expenses while the benchmark returns do not include any costs of investing. See the "Past Performance" section for the returns of the other series, which may vary because of differences in management fees and expenses or timing of series introduction.

The Fund's holdings in Brazil contributed to performance. Holdings in aerospace & defense made a positive contribution to overall performance. Holdings in construction & engineering detracted from performance during the period.

## **Asset Mix**

As always, exposure to various countries and industries shifted due to stock-specific buying and selling as well as to changes in the prices of holdings. At December 31, 2021, equities made up 98.8% of the Fund, and approximately 1.2% was in cash and other net assets.

The Fund's most significant country exposure change was an increase in holdings in the United States to 20.5% from 16.8% at December 31, 2020. The most significant industry exposure change was an increase in holdings in aerospace & defense to 8.3% from 3.9% at December 31, 2020.

The portfolio sub-advisor Brandes LP only compares the Fund to the Index in the course of ensuring that it remains appropriately diversified. As a result, the Fund's industry and country weightings were quite different from the Index during the period. For example, at December 31, 2021, one of the Fund's largest industry exposures was in household durables, which comprised 5.1% of the Fund's portfolio, versus 1.8% for the Index.

Typically less than 5% of the Fund is allocated to any one security, at the time of purchase. Therefore, the addition or deletion of an individual security will generally not constitute a substantial change to the portfolio.

The Manager confirms that the Fund did not borrow money during the period.

## **Flows & Fees**

The Fund's Net Asset Value increased to \$313.2 million at December 31, 2021, from \$255.5 million at December 31, 2020. Of this change, an increase of \$62.5 million was due to positive investment performance (net of investment income), and a decrease of \$4.8 million was due to net outflows.

For Series A units, the annualized management expense ratio ("MER") at December 31, 2021 is 2.68%, unchanged from December 31, 2020.

## **Recent Developments**

There are no known changes at this time to the strategic positioning of the Fund, the manager, or portfolio sub-advisor.

As noted in the simplified prospectus, this Fund is subject to large transaction risk because it has security holders who individually own more than 10% of the Fund. In order to reduce the impact of this risk to security holders, Bridgehouse asks, but does not require, large investors to provide notice when significant redemptions are being contemplated.

The invasion of Ukraine by Russia on February 24, 2022 has resulted in western economic sanctions being imposed on Russia, notably barring Russian banks from the SWIFT financial messaging system, a key piece of banking infrastructure. In response to sanctions, Russian markets have been closed to all foreign investors. This has caused material volatility in Russian financial markets and impacted liquidity, market access and reliability of security prices. In addition, export embargoes may lead to increased volatility in commodity prices and global supply chain disruptions. It is uncertain how long the conflict, economic sanctions and market instability will continue and whether they will escalate further. The Fund manager and portfolio sub-advisor(s) continue to actively monitor the situation for any impacts on the Fund's existing as well as potential new holdings.

Effective on or before April 22, 2022, Bridgehouse will no longer pay trailing commissions to dealers that do not make a suitability determination, such as order-execution-only ("OEO") dealers, in accordance with the Canadian Securities Administrators' decision to end the payment of trailing commissions to OEO dealers that comes into effect on June 1, 2022. Accounts held at OEO dealers will only be permitted to purchase or hold securities of Series F of the Fund, which does not pay a trailing commission.

On March 16, 2022, Bridgehouse announced that effective at the close of business on or about April 22, 2022, all Series A units of the Fund held in accounts at OEO dealers and all Series D units of the Fund, will be switched into Series F at no cost to the unitholder and without a disposition for tax purposes.

On March 16, 2022, Bridgehouse announced its intention to terminate Series D of the Fund on or about April 22, 2022. Effective on or about March 16, 2022, Series D units of the Fund will no longer be available for purchase by new or existing unitholders, including purchases made through a pre-authorized purchase plan.

Effective June 1, 2022, Bridgehouse will no longer offer purchases into the deferred sales charge ("DSC") series, including the low load series, of the Fund in accordance with the Canadian Securities Administrators' decision to

ban all DSCs in Canada. Existing DSC redemption schedules for sales made prior to June 1, 2022 will be permitted to run their course.

The outbreak of the novel coronavirus, first detected in December 2019, rapidly became a pandemic and resulted in disruptions to the economies of many nations, individual companies and the markets in general. This created closed borders, quarantines, supply chain disruptions and general anxiety, which negatively impacted global markets in an unforeseeable manner. The impact of the novel coronavirus and other such future infectious diseases in certain regions or countries may be greater or less due to the nature or level of their public health responses or due to other factors. Health crises caused by the coronavirus outbreak or future infectious diseases may exacerbate other pre-existing political, social and economic risks in certain countries. The impact of such health crises may be quick, severe and of unknowable duration. This pandemic and other epidemics and pandemics that may arise in the future could result in continued volatility in the financial markets and lead to increased levels of Fund redemptions, which could have a negative impact on the Funds and could adversely affect a Fund's performance.

## **Related Party Transactions**

### ***Manager and Portfolio Advisor***

The Fund is managed and advised by Brandes Investment Partners & Co., operating as Bridgehouse Asset Managers ("Bridgehouse") which provides (or arranges for) investment management, distribution, marketing and promotion of the Fund. Bridgehouse receives a monthly management fee based on the daily average net assets of each series of the Fund. In addition, Bridgehouse is entitled to be reimbursed by the Fund for certain operating expenses.

Brandes Investment Partners L.P. ("Brandes LP") continued to be the Manager's portfolio sub-advisor in respect of the Fund. Bridgehouse pays Brandes LP an investment management fee to provide the Fund with investment management services. Bridgehouse and Brandes LP are affiliates.

- The management expense ratio ("MER") is calculated as the total management fees and operating expenses paid by each series of the Fund, including GST/HST and interest and excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs, and is expressed as a percentage of the average daily Net Asset Value of each series of the Fund on an annualized basis. Any management fee distributions paid by a series of the fund that effectively reduced management fees payable by some unitholders are not deducted from expenses to determine the overall MER of that series. The Manager, at its sole discretion, waives management fees or absorbs expenses. Such waivers and absorptions can be terminated at any time. The MERs of the Fund are shown both with and without the waiver and absorptions.
- Portfolio turnover rate is calculated at the Fund level based on the lesser of purchases or proceeds of sales of securities for the period, excluding cash, short term notes and bonds having maturity dates at acquisition of one year or less, divided by the average value of the portfolio securities for the period. The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher a Fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a Fund.
- The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average Net Asset Value of the Fund. The trading expense ratio is calculated at the Fund level and applies to all series of the Fund.

## MANAGEMENT FEES

Bridgehouse Asset Managers, the Manager, provides or arranges for investment management, distribution, marketing and promotion of the Fund. In consideration for the services provided, Bridgehouse Asset Managers receives a monthly management fee based on the daily average Net Asset Value of Series A, Series D and Series F. Management fees for Series I are negotiated and paid directly by the unitholders of Series I, not by the Fund.

For the year ended December 31, 2021, the Fund paid Bridgehouse Asset Managers management fees of \$1,908,549. Bridgehouse uses these management fees to pay for commission payments to registered brokers and dealers and general investment management expenses. The breakdown (commission payments / investment management, administration and other) as a proportion of the management fee for each Series are:

- Series A (40% / 60%)
- Series D (15% / 85%)
- Series F (0% / 100%)
- Series I (0% / 100%)

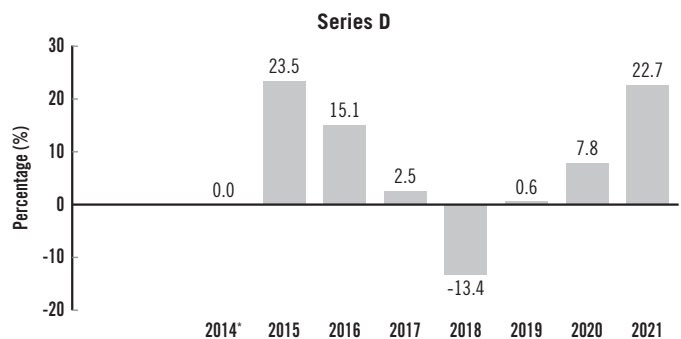
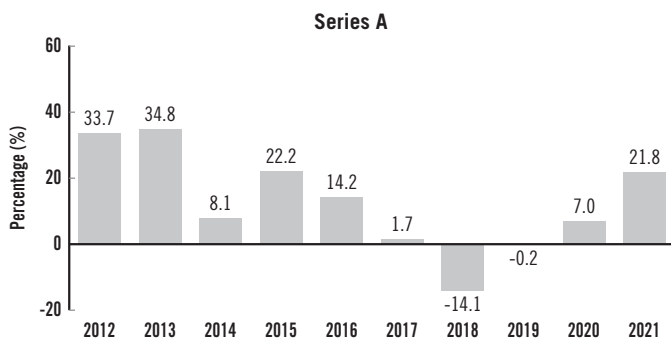
Commission payments represent cash commissions paid by Bridgehouse Asset Managers to registered brokers and dealers during the period and includes upfront deferred sales charge and trailing commissions. This amount may, in certain circumstances, exceed 100% of the fees earned by the Bridgehouse Asset Managers during the period. For new Funds or Series the amount presented may not be indicative of longer term operating periods.

## PAST PERFORMANCE

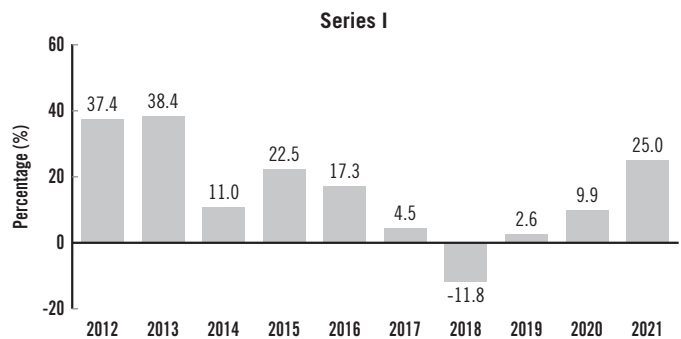
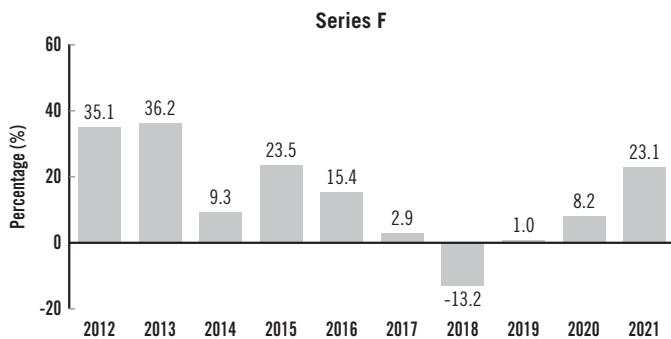

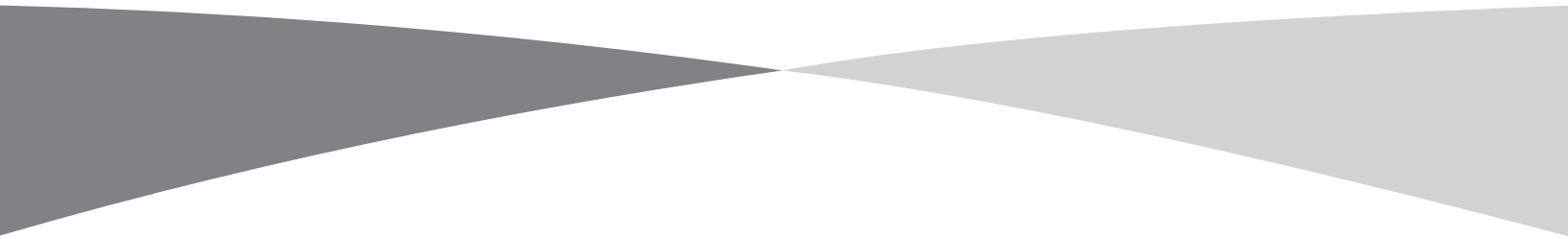
