MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION OF FUND PERFORMANCE

Results of Operations from January 1, 2022 to June 30, 2022

Markets & Effect

2022 has been a year of stagnant growth for the global stock market. The U.S. market, as represented by the S&P 500 Index, is down 18.5% over the first six months of 2022. Relative to the overall market, value equities have had favourable performance in the first half of the year.

Non-cyclical sectors have outperformed the global market during this economic slowdown. Energy is the top-performing sector on the MSCI ACWI by a large margin. It is the only sector with a positive return since the beginning of the year. Utilities and consumer staples round out the top three as the top performing sectors on the index. These defensive sectors have been outperforming cyclical sectors like consumer discretionary and technology this year. As growth in the economy slows down due to inflation and rising rates, companies that distribute essential goods and services, such as power, water, and gas have benefited.

Among global small cap companies, the S&P Developed Small Cap Index has fallen 21.1% so far this year. As with the developed large cap equity indices, energy, utilities, and consumer staples were the top three performing sectors.

The Canadian market, as represented by the S&P/TSX Composite Index, has fallen 9.9% this year, which is an outperformance over the U.S. market during this period. Energy and utilities are the only sectors to post positive returns in the first half of 2022 while health care and technology have both fallen over 50% during this period.

The International market, as represented by the MSCI EAFE Index, has slightly outperformed the U.S. market with a loss of 17.9% this year. Energy was the only positive returning sector on the MSCI EAFE Index for the first two quarters of 2022.

Emerging Markets (EM), as measured by the MSCI EM Index, is down 15.9% this year. The energy sector for EM has not followed the trend of Global and North American markets as it is down 24% this year. The war continues in Ukraine and has caused significant geopolitical and macroeconomic tensions in surrounding nations as well as

on the energy sector. The technology sectors in China and Taiwan have also been major detractors in performance. In Brandes' opinion, the volatility in emerging markets is not unusual and has often created attractive and overlooked opportunities.

Performance

The Fund's Series A units outperformed its benchmark, losing 16.8% versus a loss of 18.5% for the MSCI All Country World Index (the "Index").

The Fund returns are after the deduction of fees and expenses while the benchmark returns do not include any costs of investing. See the "Past Performance" section for the returns of the other series, which may vary because of differences in management fees and expenses or timing of series introduction.

The Fund's holdings in the United States contributed to relative performance. Holdings in internet & direct marketing retail made a positive contribution to overall performance. Holdings in aerospace & defense detracted from performance for the period.

Asset Mix

As always, exposure to various countries and industries shifted due to stock-specific buying and selling as well as to changes in the prices of holdings. At June 30, 2022, equities made up 98.5% of the Fund, and approximately 1.5% was in cash and other net assets.

The Fund's most significant country exposure change was a decrease in holdings in Russia to nil from 3.6% at December 31, 2021. One of the largest industry exposure changes was a decrease in holdings in commercial banks to 9.4% from 11.8% at December 31, 2021.

In line with its bottom-up investment philosophy, Brandes LP continues to build the portfolio on a company-by-company basis. Brandes LP only compares the Fund to the Index in the course of ensuring that it remains appropriately diversified. As a result, the Fund's industry

and country weightings were quite different from the Index during the period. For example, at June 30, 2022, one of the Fund's largest industry exposures was in media, which comprised 6.6% of the Fund's portfolio, versus 0.8% for the Index.

Typically less than 5% of the Fund is allocated to any one security, at the time of purchase. Therefore, the addition or deletion of an individual security will generally not constitute a substantial change to the portfolio.

The Manager confirms that the Fund did not borrow money during the period.

Flows & Fees

The Fund's Net Asset Value increased to \$188.1 million at June 30, 2022, from \$245.7 million at December 31, 2021. Of this change, a decrease of \$39.1 million was due to negative investment performance (net of investment income), and a decrease of \$18.5 million was due to net outflows.

For Series A units, the annualized management expense ratio ("MER") at June 30, 2022 is 2.46%, unchanged from December 31, 2021.

Recent Developments

There are no known changes at this time to the strategic positioning of the Fund, the manager, or portfolio sub-advisor.

The invasion of Ukraine by Russia on February 24, 2022 has resulted in western economic sanctions being imposed on Russia, notably barring Russian banks from the SWIFT financial messaging system, a key piece of banking infrastructure. In response to sanctions, Russian markets have been closed to all foreign investors. This has caused material volatility in Russian financial markets and impacted liquidity, market access and reliability of security prices. In addition, export embargoes may lead to increased volatility in commodity prices and global supply chain disruptions. It is uncertain how long the conflict, economic sanctions and market instability will continue and whether they will escalate further. The Fund manager and portfolio sub-advisor(s) continue to actively monitor the situation for any impacts on the Fund's existing as well as potential new holdings.

Effective April 22, 2022, Bridgehouse no longer pays trailing commissions to dealers that do not make a suitability determination, such as order-execution-only ("OEO") dealers, in accordance with the Canadian Securities Administrators' decision to end the payment of trailing commissions to OEO dealers that came into effect on June 1, 2022. Accounts held at OEO dealers are only permitted to purchase or hold securities of Series F of the Fund, which does not pay a trailing commission.

On April 22, 2022, all Series A units of the Fund held in accounts at OEO dealers were switched into Series F at no cost to the unitholder and without a disposition for tax purposes.

Effective June 1, 2022, Bridgehouse no longer offers purchases into the deferred sales charge ("DSC") series, including the low load series, of the Fund in accordance with the Canadian Securities Administrators' decision to ban all DSCs in Canada. Existing DSC redemption schedules for sales made prior to June 1, 2022 will be permitted to run their course.

The outbreak of the novel coronavirus, first detected in December 2019, rapidly became a pandemic and resulted in disruptions to the economies of many nations, individual companies and the markets in general. This created closed borders, quarantines, supply chain disruptions and general anxiety, which negatively impacted global markets in an unforeseeable manner. The impact of the novel coronavirus and other such future infectious diseases in certain regions or countries may be greater or less due to the nature or level of their public health responses or due to other factors. Health crises caused by the coronavirus outbreak or future infectious diseases may exacerbate other pre-existing political, social and economic risks in certain countries. The impact of such health crises may be quick, severe and of unknowable duration. This pandemic and other epidemics and pandemics that may arise in the future could result in continued volatility in the financial markets and lead to increased levels of Fund redemptions, which could have a negative impact on the Funds and could adversely affect a Fund's performance.

Related Party Transactions

Manager and Portfolio Advisor

The Fund is managed and advised by Brandes Investment Partners & Co., operating as Bridgehouse Asset Managers ("Bridgehouse") which provides (or arranges for) investment management, distribution, marketing and promotion of the Fund. Bridgehouse receives a monthly management fee based on the daily average net assets of each series of the Fund. In addition, Bridgehouse is entitled to be reimbursed by the Fund for certain operating expenses.

Brandes Investment Partners L.P. ("Brandes LP") continued to be the Manager's portfolio sub-advisor in respect of the Fund. Bridgehouse pays Brandes LP an investment management fee to provide the Fund with investment management services. Bridgehouse and Brandes LP are affiliates.

- The management expense ratio ("MER") is calculated as the total management fees and operating expenses paid by each series of the Fund, including GST/HST and interest and excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs, and is expressed as a percentage of the average daily Net Asset Value of each series of the Fund on an annualized basis. Any management fee distributions paid by a series of the fund that effectively reduced management fees payable by some unitholders are not deducted from expenses to determine the overall MER of that series. The Manager, at its sole discretion, waives management fees or absorbs expenses. Such waivers and absorptions can be terminated at any time. The MERs of the Fund are shown both with and without the waiver and absorptions.
- Portfolio turnover rate is calculated at the Fund level based on the lesser of purchases or proceeds of sales of securities for the period, excluding cash, short term notes and bonds having maturity dates at acquisition of one year or less, divided by the average value of the portfolio securities for the period. The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher a Fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a Fund.
- The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average Net Asset Value of the Fund. The trading expense ratio is calculated at the Fund level and applies to all series of the Fund.

MANAGEMENT FEES

Bridgehouse Asset Managers, the Manager, provides or arranges for investment management, distribution, marketing and promotion of the Fund. In consideration for the services provided, Bridgehouse Asset Managers receives a monthly management fee based on the daily average Net Asset Value of Series A and Series F. Management fees for Series I are negotiated and paid directly by the unitholders of Series I, not by the Fund.

For the six months period ended June 30, 2022, the Fund paid Bridgehouse Asset Managers management fees of \$1,718,041. Bridgehouse uses these management fees to pay for commission payments to registered brokers and dealers and general investment management expenses. The breakdown (commission payments / investment management, administration and other) as a proportion of the management fee for each Series are:

- Series A (43% / 57%)
- Series F (0% / 100%)
- Series I (0% / 100%)

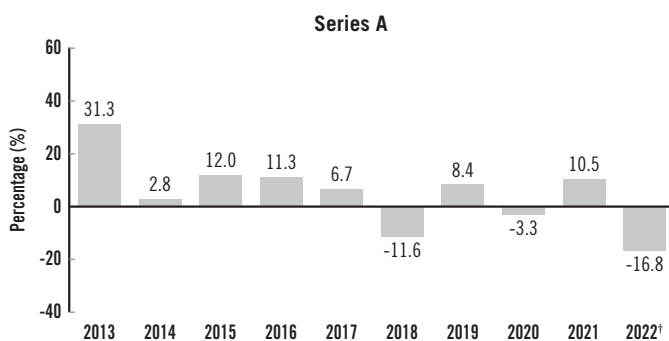
Commission payments represent cash commissions paid by Bridgehouse Asset Managers to registered brokers and dealers during the period and includes upfront deferred sales charge and trailing commissions. This amount may, in certain circumstances, exceed 100% of the fees earned by the Bridgehouse Asset Managers during the period. For new Funds or Series the amount presented may not be indicative of longer term operating periods.

PAST PERFORMANCE

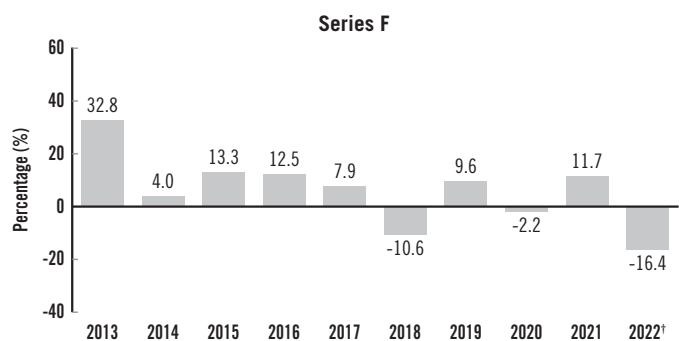

Keep in mind that past performance does not necessarily indicate how the Fund will perform in the future.

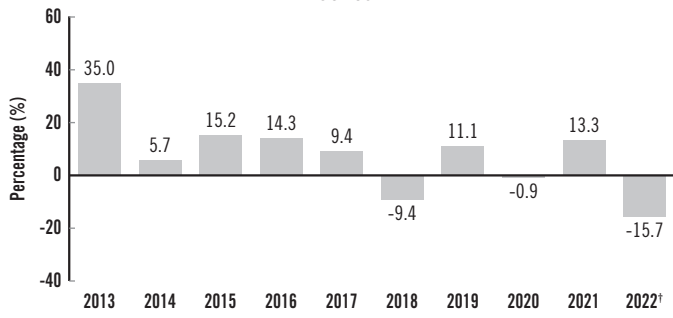


[†]Six-month return from January 1 to June 30, 2022.

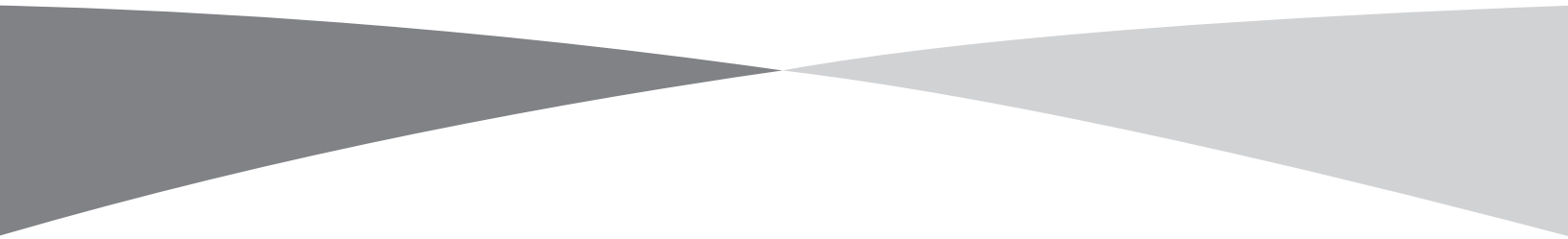
