MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION OF FUND PERFORMANCE

Investment Objective and Strategies

The objective of the Fund is to grow capital by investing in primarily global equity securities.

The portfolio sub-advisor in respect of this Fund, Lazard Asset Management (Canada) Inc., has retained Lazard Asset Management LLC ("Lazard") as its sub-advisor, which employs a team-based approach in the management of the Fund. Lazard's strategy is founded on the philosophy that an understanding of the current economic environment can be coupled with research into the drivers of (and risk to) outperformance to create a portfolio aligned with the current economic cycle.

The Fund seeks to generate strong relative returns over a full market cycle by investing solely in world's leading companies that can generate, and sustain, the highest levels of financial productivity (i.e., return on equity, return on capital, and cashflow return on investment).

Generally, the number of holdings will range between 40-50 positions with individual positions typically limited 7% in the Fund.

The Fund offers both a Hedged and Unhedged Series of units. The Hedged Series is designed for investors who might be uncomfortable with fluctuations in the U.S. dollar. The Unhedged Series is for investors who wish to be exposed to fluctuations in the U.S. dollar.

Risk

As an investor in this Fund, you should be prepared for short-term performance fluctuations, and be a patient, long-term holder.

There were no significant changes to the level or type of risk you would expect from the Fund over the course of the year. It continues to have a medium risk level. Refer to the Fund's simplified prospectus for a complete list of all risks.

Results of Operations from January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2022

Markets & Effect

Global outlooks for inflation and interest rates remained front and center in the minds of investors over the course of 2022. In addition, the war in Ukraine, US/China relations and slowing corporate profits continued to dominate investor fears.

In the U.S., as markets had expected, the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) downshifted to a 50-bps rate hike in December after four consecutive 75-bps increases in earlier months, pushing its short-term interest rate to its highest level in 15 years. The inverted yield curve, tepid consumer spending and weak manufacturing orders all point to a likely recession in 2023. More importantly, the Fed dashed any hopes that it would adopt a less hawkish stance by signaling that because domestic inflation remained elevated, it expected to raise rates higher over the coming few years than it had previously anticipated. The U.S. equity market, as measured by the S&P 500 Index, posted a 12.6% loss for the year.

Across the Atlantic, key central banks quickly followed suit, with the European Central Bank, the Bank of England, and the Swiss National Bank all announcing that they, too, were lifting their main lending rates, with more increases possibly on the horizon. The warning from these major central banks that they were committed to crushing stubbornly high inflation at a time when economies were already slowing unnerved investors and drove international stock markets downward to end the year down 8.2%, as measured by the MSCI EAFE Index. In Japan, near the end of the year, the Bank of Japan made the surprise move to widen their yield curve control bands, effectively signaling their willingness to increase interest rates for the first time in years. Japan should be a beneficiary of China reopening and the weaker yen could help its economic recovery.

Turning to emerging markets, the MSCI Emerging Markets Index lost 14.3% for the year. While worries about inflation and central-bank actions continued to hang over markets, investors were also monitoring developments in China closely. Xi Jinping's rise as China's most powerful leader in

generations was confirmed in October when he secured an unprecedented third term as president, leading to a steep sell-off in the Chinese equity market on fears that Xi's ideology-driven policies would not bode well for China's economy. China's stock market made a strong recovery in the subsequent two months, however, after the government began to relax its zero-COVID policy to boost domestic spending and international travel. Unfortunately, this also resulted in a near-term surge in COVID cases at year end.

Globally, it appears that fears of immediate recession in 2022 were misjudged: the starting point for the economy was better than many understood, and the full impact of tighter monetary policy may not yet have been realized, and easily could be exacerbated, both by unprecedented synchronization among central banks globally and by an unusually rapid rate-hiking cycle.

Performance

The Fund's Unhedged Series A units trailed its benchmark, losing 17.0% versus a loss of 12.4% for the MSCI All Country World Index (the "Index"). The Fund's hedged Series A units also trailed its benchmark, losing 20.3% versus a loss of 12.4% for the MSCI All Country World Index (the "Index").

The Fund returns are after the deduction of fees and expenses while the benchmark returns do not include any costs of investing. See the "Past Performance" section for the returns of the other series, which may vary because of differences in management fees and expenses or timing of series introduction.

Holdings in entertainment contributed to relative performance, while holdings in pharmaceuticals detracted from performance during the period. Holdings in Canada contributed to performance, while holdings in Japan detracted from performance during the period.

Asset Mix

At December 31, 2022, equities made up 97.6% of the Fund, and approximately 2.4% was in cash and other net assets.

One of the the Fund's most significant industry exposure changes was an increase in holdings in health care equipment & supplies to 6.4% from 2.9% at December 31, 2021.

The Manager confirms that the Fund did not borrow money during the period.

Flows & Fees

The Fund's Net Asset Value decreased to \$107.2 million at December 31, 2022, from \$131.5 million at December 31, 2021. Of this change, a decrease of \$22.5 million was due to negative investment performance (net of investment income), and a decrease of \$1.8 million was due to net outflows.

For Series A units, the annualized management expense ratio ("MER") at December 31, 2022 is 2.14%, unchanged from December 31, 2021, for the Unhedged series. The annualized MER for the Hedged series is 2.14% at December 31, 2022, compared to 2.12% at December 31, 2021.

Recent Developments

Unitholders in eligible series of Lazard Global Compounders Fund, who were eligible for and participated in the Greystone Global Equity Fund Introductory Pricing Program (the GGEF Pricing Program), will continue to benefit from the fee reductions under the GGEF Pricing Program.

With inflation outpacing expectations, central banks around the world reversed their accommodative stance and began aggressively hiking interest rates in the second half of 2022. Equity markets began to spiral downward in late summer 2022, when it became clear that the world's most influential central bank, the US Federal Reserve (Fed), would keep interest rates elevated for as long as it took to tame high domestic consumer prices, even if it risked tipping the economy into a recession. The Fed's aggressive rate hiking led to a significant strengthening of the US dollar, the world's reserve currency from which many key commodities, such as oil, are priced. While a strong dollar eased some domestic inflation by making imports to the US cheaper, it also, in effect, exported some inflation to other countries, causing economic turmoil in the rest of the world. While a variety of headwinds face stocks and bonds today (elevated inflation, slowing economic growth and recession concerns, energy risk, and political and regulatory risks, just to name a few), the Team believes that the Fund's overall positioning offers an attractive opportunity for long-term investors.

The invasion of Ukraine by Russia on February 24, 2022 has resulted in western economic sanctions being imposed on Russia, notably barring Russian banks from the SWIFT financial messaging system, a key piece of banking infrastructure. In response to sanctions, Russian markets have been closed to all foreign investors. This has caused material volatility in Russian financial markets and impacted liquidity, market access and reliability of security prices. In addition, export embargoes may lead to increased volatility in commodity prices and global supply chain disruptions. It is uncertain how long the conflict, economic sanctions and market instability will continue and whether they will escalate further. The Fund manager and portfolio sub-advisor(s) continue to actively monitor the situation for any impacts on the Fund's existing as well as potential new holdings.

Effective April 22, 2022, Bridgehouse no longer pays trailing commissions to dealers that do not make a suitability determination, such as order-execution-only ("OEO") dealers, in accordance with the Canadian Securities

Administrators' decision to end the payment of trailing commissions to OEO dealers that came into effect on June 1, 2022. Accounts held at OEO dealers are only permitted to purchase or hold securities of Series F of the Fund, which does not pay a trailing commission.

On April 22, 2022, all Series A units of the Fund held in accounts at OEO dealers were switched into Series F at no cost to the unitholder and without a disposition for tax purposes.

Related Party Transactions

Manager and Portfolio Sub-Advisor

The Fund is managed and advised by Brandes Investment Partners & Co., operating as Bridgehouse Asset Managers which provides (or arranges for) investment management, distribution, marketing and promotion of the Fund.

Bridgehouse receives a monthly management fee based on the daily average net assets of each series of the Fund. In addition, Bridgehouse is entitled to be reimbursed by the Fund for certain operating expenses.

Bridgehouse has retained Lazard Asset Management (Canada), Inc. who has retained Lazard Asset Management LLC, ("Lazard") as the portfolio sub-advisor in respect of the Fund. Bridgehouse pays Lazard an investment management fee to provide the Fund with investment management services.

- The management expense ratio ("MER") is calculated as the total management fees and operating expenses paid by each series of the Fund, including GST/HST and interest and excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs, and is expressed as a percentage of the average daily Net Asset Value of each series of the Fund on an annualized basis. Any management fee distributions paid by a series of the fund that effectively reduced management fees payable by some unitholders are not deducted from expenses to determine the overall MER of that series. The Manager, at its sole discretion, waives management fees or absorbs expenses. Such waivers and absorptions can be terminated at any time. The MERs of the Fund are shown both with and without the waiver and absorptions.
- Portfolio turnover rate is calculated at the Fund level based on the lesser of purchases or proceeds of sales of securities for the period, excluding cash, short term notes and bonds having maturity dates at acquisition of one year or less, divided by the average value of the portfolio securities for the period. The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher a Fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a Fund.
- The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average Net Asset Value of the Fund. The trading expense ratio is calculated at the Fund level and applies to all series of the Fund.

MANAGEMENT FEES

Bridgehouse Asset Managers, the Manager, provides or arranges for investment management, distribution, marketing and promotion of the Fund. In consideration for the services provided, Bridgehouse Asset Managers receives a monthly management fee based on the daily average Net Asset Value of Series A, Series AH, Series F and Series FH. Management fees for Series I and Series IH are negotiated and paid directly by the unitholders of Series I and Series IH, not by the Fund.

For the year ended December 31, 2022, the Fund paid Bridgehouse Asset Managers management fees of \$1,261,773. Bridgehouse uses these management fees to pay for commission payments to registered brokers and dealers and general investment management expenses. The breakdown (commission payments / investment management, administration and other) as a proportion of the management fee for each Series are:

- Series A, AH (53% / 47%)
- Series F, FH (0% / 100%)
- Series I, IH (0% / 100%)

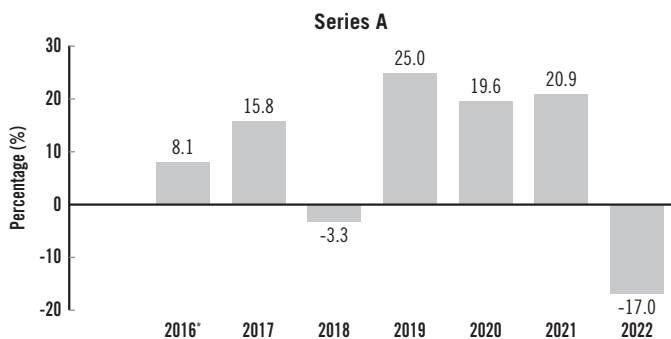
Commission payments represent cash commissions paid by Bridgehouse Asset Managers to registered brokers and dealers during the period and includes upfront deferred sales charge and trailing commissions. This amount may, in certain circumstances, exceed 100% of the fees earned by the Bridgehouse Asset Managers during the period. For new Funds or Series the amount presented may not be indicative of longer term operating periods.

PAST PERFORMANCE

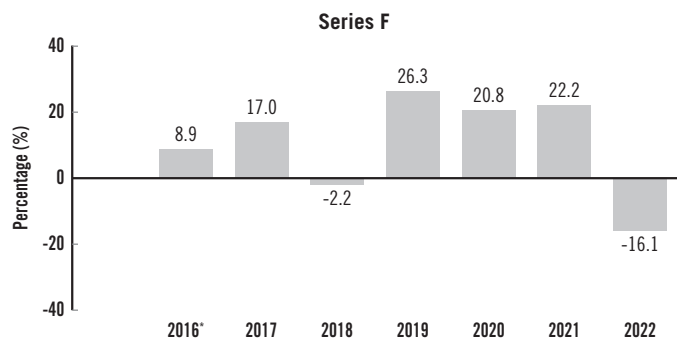

Year-by-Year Returns (%)

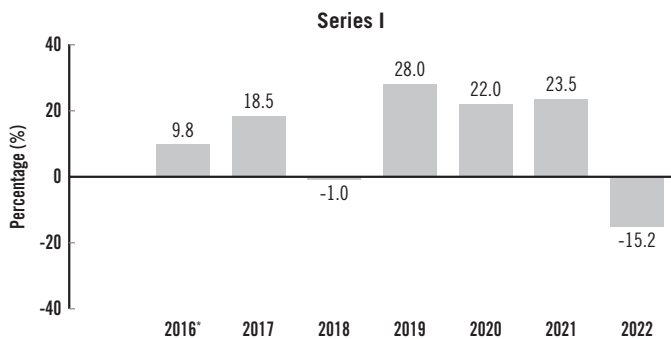

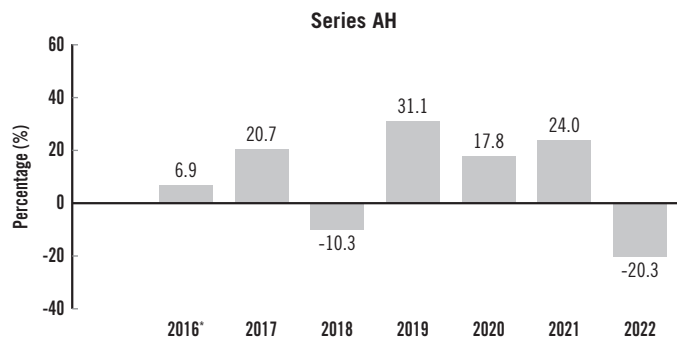

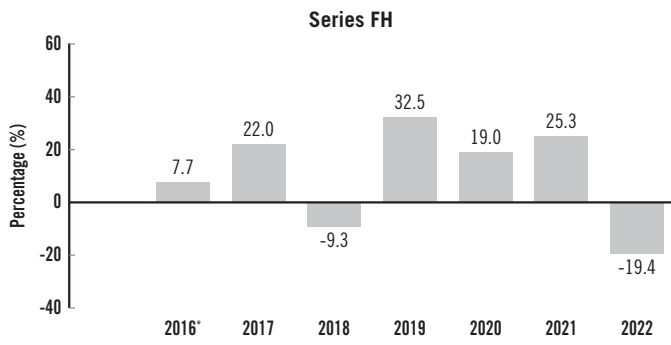

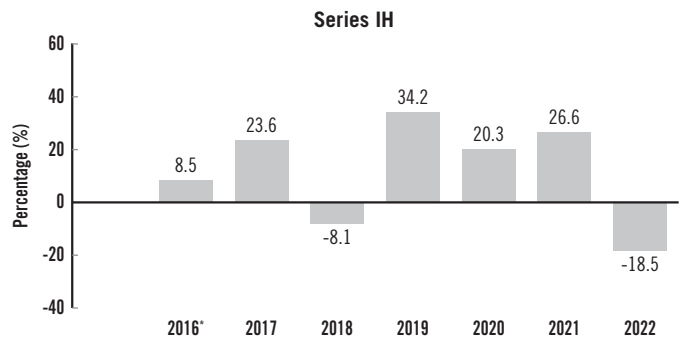
